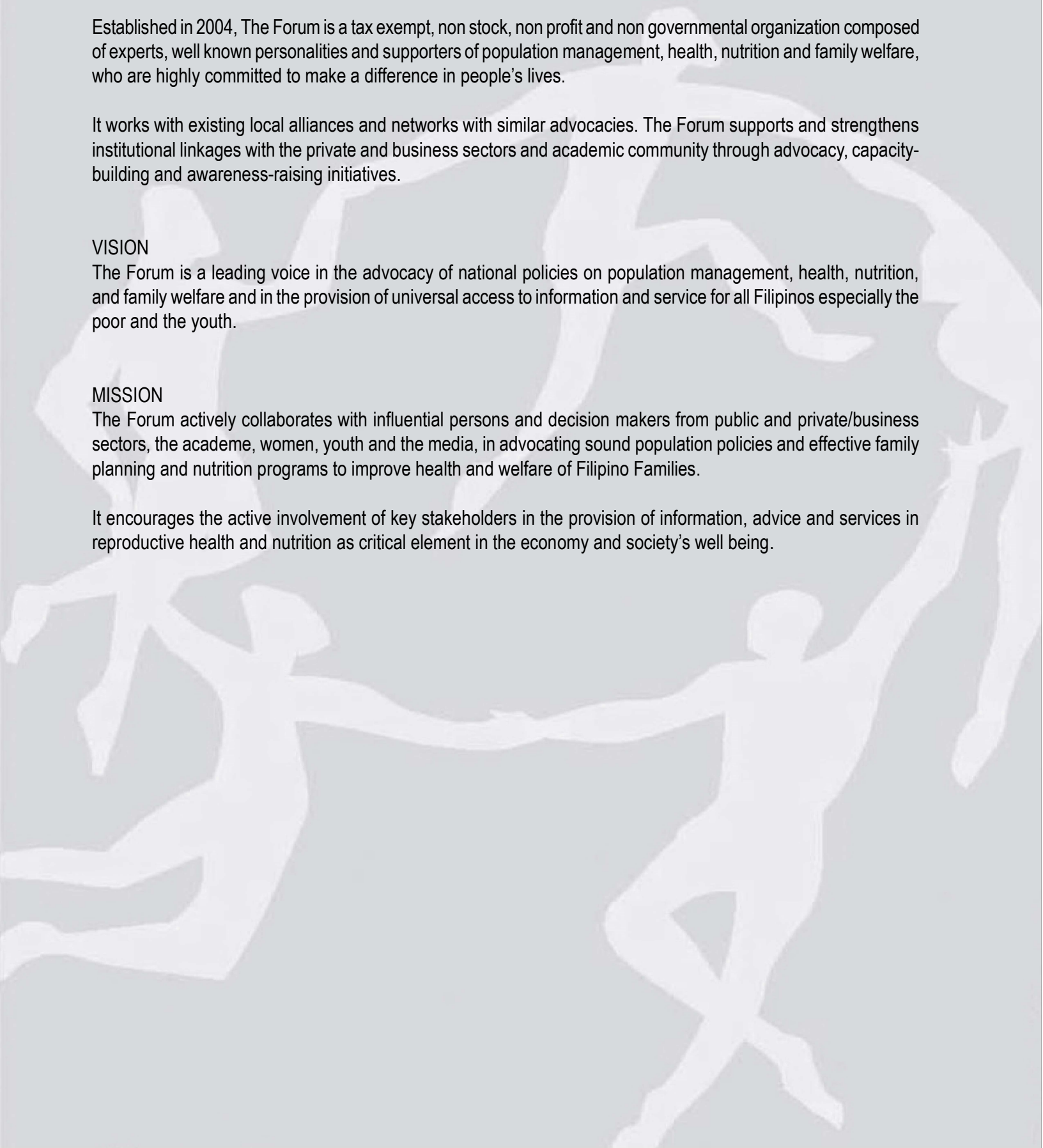
VISION

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Message from the President

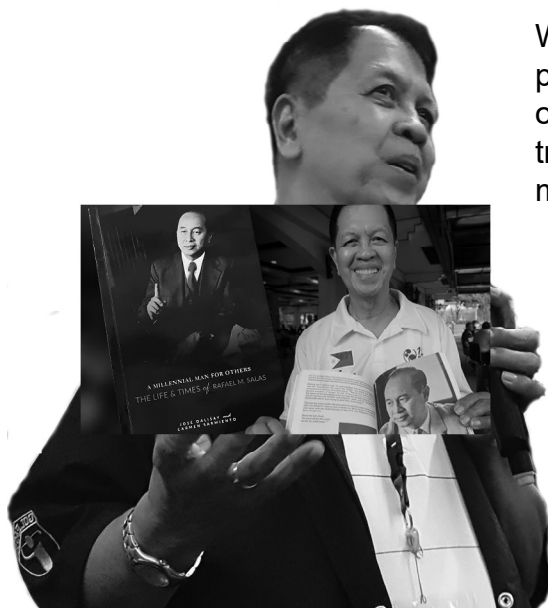
The Forum for Family Planning and Development, Inc. continued to adapt its advocacy efforts despite the shrinking spaces for civil society organizations due to shift of national and local governments' focus to COVID-19 response. Adapting to the challenges of working across online and hybrid spaces to fulfil the organization's mission, in 2021 we continued our local advocacy in the Province of Albay and Cebu's Tri-cities; Lapu-Lapu City, Mandaue City, and Cebu City.

In Daraga, Albay, in partnership with the provincial and municipal health offices, our team piloted the MOMCHAT, or the Municipality Optimized Maternal and Child Health Assistance Tracker (MOMCHAT). A web-based dashboard application and SMS-based data receiver for forecasting demand and supply of medical needs for maternal health care in a locality. In this implementation of a pilot run of the technology, we saw promising ICT-based solution which may help provide crucial RH related data in real time that LGUs and national government could use for data-based policy decisions.

In Cebu's Tri-cities, we implemented the ReachYouth project, a USAID-ReachHealth supported project by which is a continuation of the Forum's engagement with Cebu City's Night High schools in previous years (since 2015). Entitled 'Reach Youth in the Margins: Improve State of Reproductive Health of Night High School Students in Cebu's Tri-City', this project intends to contribute to a long-term goal of improving the state of reproductive health of adolescents and youth coming from Night High Schools, and the implementation of Comprehensive Sexuality Education (CSE) in the Night High Schools youth and adolescents are linked to public and private health facilities that would respond to their reproductive health needs.

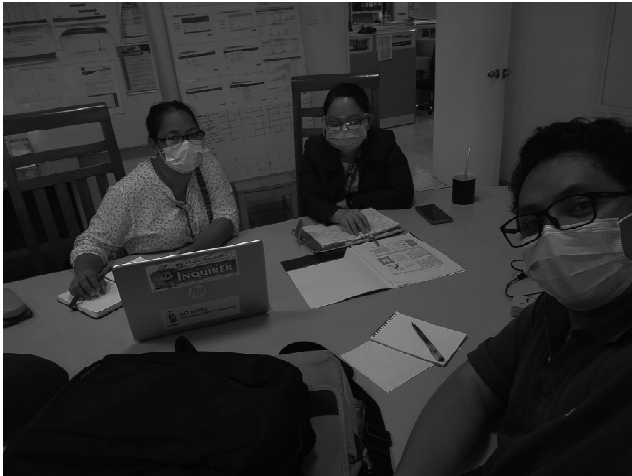
This year, we are able to reach 146 public school teachers who received training on bridging the gaps in teaching reproductive health to their students. A total of 92 barangay officials and Sangguniang Kabataan officials were enabled to participate in RH issue orientations and educational discussions. And a total of 48 health personnel of the Department of Education from Cebu Tri-cities were trained to communicate and advocate ARH.

While our team had so much limitations due to pandemic-induced disruptions, we are able to work it out. I express my gratitude to the eminent persons, trustees and advisers for their trust and confidence in me and the members of the secretariat.

Working around the divide in Maternal and Child Health



Amid pandemic, health inequity in reproductive health services became more evident. While most of the health facilities and services shifted to COVID-19 response, most lactating mothers with newborn and pregnant women were pushed away from life-saving pre-natal care they are supposed to receive. They are categorized as COVID-19 high-risk group, as they may get very sick if infected during or after giving birth.

The Forum for Family Planning and Development in 2020 was supported by United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), and with the support IT professors of MAPUA, have worked on an application called MOMCHAT – Municipality-Optimized Maternal and Child Health Assistance Tracker. This application has mobile and desktop capabilities, where the MOMCHAT technology collects and analyze data inputs to look into the maternal and child health situation of the municipality. It gives the health officer and the local chief a real time view of who are pregnant, who are with high-risk pregnancy, and where are these mothers.

In our present situation amid the pandemic, and even in normal state of the world, ensuring that there is updated and actual data to understand our maternal health situation can allow state actors to respond to the needs of women. Technology needs to be responsive to the people and its users. The Forum believes that the ‘ang isang paa ng buntis ay nasa hukay’ frame of mind should not be part of the norm of thinking in this age of digital revolution. We have the technology and mechanisms to ensure that no mother dies because of childbearing. With MOMCHAT giving us real time data, health workers can prepare enough blood supply to prevent death due to hemorrhage.

The application is also capable of flagging which mothers are with high-risk pregnancy, which can enable health workers to identify who would need special care and more attention. The application provides its end user their location, hence, if the mother is from a geographically isolated and depressed area (GIDA), it may give the health unit enough time to prepare a half-way home or a means to transport the mother to the birthing facility in a timely manner. In many ways, we can ensure that families are healthy and happy by protecting the life of the mother of their homes.

MOMCHAT technology is also responsive in a way that it allows the use of text (SMS) message to send information to the application. Putting the context of barangay health workers (BHW), especially those in GIDA with limited access to data connection and sometimes affected by power interruptions, like in the case of our pilot area, Daraga, Albay.

We have observed that the delay of reporting in the local government level is that barangay health workers (BHW) manually record their data gathering in a sheet of papers (log book or yellow pads), forward it to their local public midwives for checking and transmit it to the rural health unit to be encoded. The entire process would more or less take a week to a month. Hence, this MOMCHAT can help cut the delay and address the data gap in maternal and child health.

It is a sustainable solution, specifically, it addresses the data gap on maternal health and the state of reproductive health of mothers becomes closer to the local chief executive. The data can also aid to policy making and program improvement. The application also looks promising as it can be redesigned to be used for monitoring the inventory of vaccines for neonates and children, family planning commodities, and other supplies necessary to advance maternal and child health.

While the MOMCHAT offers a promising potential to advance maternal and child health, the Forum has limited funding support to scale up the technology, and run it in full swing in different areas.



No Student Left Behind

ReachYouth Project in Night High Schools of Cebu's Tri-City

Supported by USAID, under the ReachHealth project of RTI International, the Forum is implementing a program called Reach Youth in the Margins - Improve State of Reproductive Health of Night High. This initiative intends to contribute to a long-term goal of improving the state of reproductive health of adolescents and youth coming from Night High Schools of the cities of Cebu, Lapu-Lapu and Mandaue in Cebu province. Specifically, it aims to contribute to achieving the above goal by helping to accelerate the implementation of Comprehensive Sexuality Education (CSE) in the Night High Schools and ensuring that the youth and adolescents are linked to public and private health facilities that would respond to their reproductive health needs.

This Forum's initiative can be traced back in a partnership with Abellana National High School in 2013-2014 where we conducted ARH forum in the afternoon. When the event was about to end an interested student came in late and was dismayed. With further questioning, it was found out that the student is attending the Night High School. It was an eye opener for the organization to realize how big is the Night High School population of Cebu City. In 2015 there were only nine Night High Schools in Cebu City. Before the pandemic it increased to 19 and recently it has become over 20 schools already. The rapid urbanization will certainly have left someone behind if we don't act now – that they should be part of the development interventions, otherwise, they will be left out.

Cities like Lapu-Lapu, Mandaue and Cebu are experiencing the effects of this growth. The fact that these cities have a Night High School program is a response to a growing demand to provide the education needs of a growing population. Combined population of the three cities is at 1.69M and growing.



Who are the Night High School Students?

Night High School students are considered to come from poorest families and have lesser access to health programs that are often administered during regular school hours. Classes start at 3:00PM until 9:00PM Mondays to Fridays and from 8:00AM to 4:00PM on Saturdays. This makes Night High School Students among the most vulnerable populations even more so in terms of access to reproductive health services since most local government run clinics for example, even those in their own schools are closed in the evenings during the time of their classes. Most government agencies and NGOs who provide RH services also operate during regular working hours.



ReachYouth in the Margins – facilitating social integration

Certainly, talking about sex and sexuality remain a taboo in the country. While most education institution and their personnel acknowledge that teenage pregnancy, gender-based violence, and STIs and HIV among young people are of prime concern, still, ensuring that the young people are part of the conversations remain unfulfilled. This initiative worked towards helping the Department of Education division offices of Cebu City, Mandaue City and Lapu-Lapu City be more open to creating safe spaces for sex education to happen.

This year, three batches of Bridging the Gaps in teaching Reproductive Health were conducted. The training is aimed to help teachers deepen their grasps on pressing sexual and reproductive health issues, reflect and clarify their values, and frame their roles as duty bearers in the fulfilment of rights of their learners to comprehensive sexuality education as mandated in the RPRH Law. A total of 146 teachers were trained in this program.

Equally important is to ensure that young people have access to health services. This year, we worked with the school health personnel of the DepEd division offices of Cebu City, Mandaue City and Lapu-Lapu City towards development of capacity building activities for their team, their clinic teachers, and other teaching and non-teaching personnel. A total of 46 health personnel were trained in communicating and advocating RH. Likewise, Cebu City Federation of Student Council Officers were provided with a leadership training which resulted to students' council-initiated development of IEC materials for their constituencies.

To ensure facilitation of spaces outside the four corners of the schools, the Forum engaged with the SK Federations of the Tri-Cities. As the key institution mandated to develop programs and policies anchored on the Philippine Youth Development Plan which of the of key areas of participation is Health – with specific directions to advance sexual and reproductive health. A total of 96 SK officials with three SK Federation Presidents were given information on ARH. This effort resulted to local-led activities such as online forum, FB lives, and allocation of local funds to RH activities. Lesson from the ground – the SKs can be the strongest partner of the Department of Education to bridge the gaps in sexual and reproductive health information and services which the school community cannot provide to young people. While it is expected from the Department of Education to deliver Comprehensive Sexuality Education, the SK can sustain building the knowledge, skills, and attitude of the young people at the community level. Most importantly, the SK can facilitate consultations with the youth and other stakeholders towards the development of youth programs and policies which will further promote social integration.

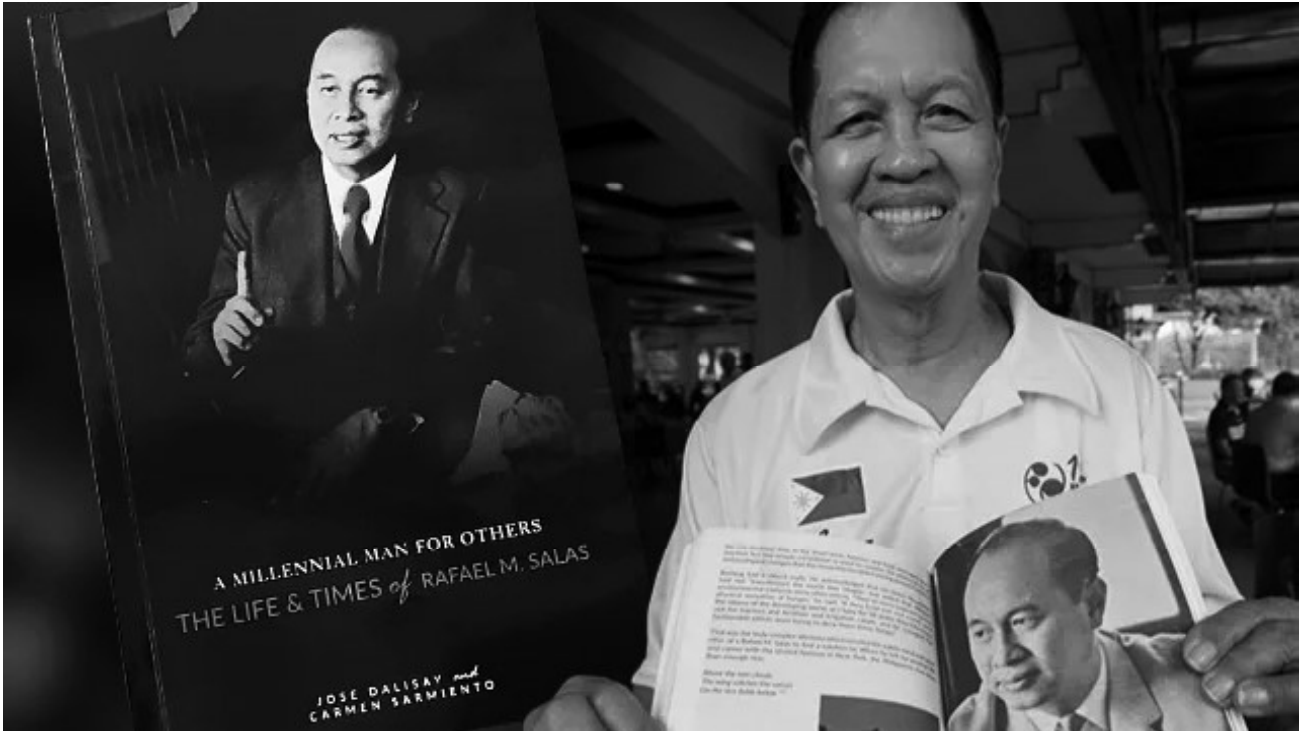

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of The Forum for Family Planning and Development, Inc. (the Organization), which comprise the statements of assets, liabilities and fund balance as at December 31, 2021 and 2020, and the statements of revenue and expenses, statements of changes in fund balance and statements of cash flows for the years then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Organization as at December 31, 2021 and 2020, and its financial performance and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with Philippine Financial Reporting Standards for Small Entities (PFRS for SEs).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with Philippine Standards on Auditing (PSAs). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the Organization in accordance with the Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants in the Philippines (Code of Ethics) together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in the Philippines, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the Code of Ethics. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with PFRS for SEs, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.



In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Organization's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Organization or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Organization's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with PSAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with PSAs, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Company's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Organization's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Organization to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.



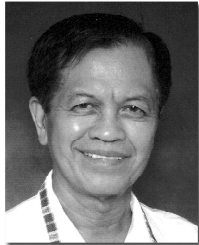

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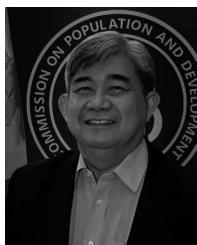


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
