EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

CAPACITY BUILDING

The Forum for Family Planning and Development has significantly advanced capacity-building efforts across various sectors, fostering gender equality, youth empowerment, and public health leadership.

- In 2023, it supported the Philippine Women's University in integrating SOGIE into a training manual for fathers to combat VAWC, promoting gender sensitivity and family resilience.
- In the past two years, it has also conducted coaching sessions and workshops for over 120 youth leaders nationwide, equipping them to design and implement impactful advocacy and community projects.
- Additionally, The Forum contributed to the professional growth of 80 public health nurses by providing technical support for the UPCN Leadership Development Course (batches 2023 and 2024). These initiatives have empowered individuals and sparked transformative change in communities across the country.
- In 2024, in partnership with the DOH and CPD, The Forum worked with 40 media and communications personalities in a media training specific to promote maternal and child health and nutrition and family planning.

AWARENESS-RAISING ACTIVITIES

The Forum for Family Planning and Development spearheaded impactful initiatives in 2023 and 2024 to promote comprehensive sexuality education (CSE), adolescent reproductive health (ARH), and family planning. Through forums, webinars, and partnerships with academic institutions, UN SDSN Youth Philippines, Bayer Philippines, the DOH, and CPD, the Forum engaged over 3,000 participants, including youth leaders, educators, and health workers, on key topics like SRHR, sexual harassment prevention, and HIV awareness. Highlighting its efforts.

Key activity The Forum has been spearheading since 2018 is the World Contraception Day, the first time the Philippines has joined this global movement. In 2023 and 2024, we organized campaigns for World Contraception Day, featuring webinars, media activities, and social media outreach that reached broad audiences and empowered individuals to make informed reproductive health decisions, advancing public awareness and advocacy for accessible SRHR services.

ADVOCACY ACTIVITIES

The Forum for Family Planning and Development has been at the forefront of high-level advocacy initiatives to advance reproductive health and family planning in the Philippines. In 2023, it spearheaded efforts with POPCOM and DOH to revive the National Conference on Family Planning (NCFP), securing support from key development partners and formalizing the NCFP National Steering, Program, and Scientific Committees. These efforts culminated in the 2024 NCFP Youth Conference and the main NCFP event, uniting stakeholders to address critical health issues, ultimately calling for the passage of SB 1979 or Prevention of Adolescent Pregnancy Bill.

Regionally, The Forum co-led the 1st Bicol Regional HIV/AIDS and SRH Summit, showcasing its commitment to inclusive, evidence-based approaches. These milestones underscore The Forum's leadership in fostering collaboration and driving progress in reproductive health advocacy.

NETWORK AND LINKAGES

The Forum for Family Planning and Development strengthened its networks and partnerships through key activities, including a courtesy call with POPCOM Executive Director Usec. Lisa Grace Bersales, sustained collaborations with USAID's REACHHEALTH program, POGS-Cebu, and PNA-Cebu, and active participation in Region VII's RPRH Law implementation and teen center accreditation efforts. It supported DepEd partners in Cebu, distributed over 1,000 adolescent FP booklets, and facilitated consultations on its CSE-ARH materials. Post-SULONG RH efforts included reconnecting with partners in Albay, Cebu, and Baguio-Benguet. Technical assistance was also provided to the AHF GABAY Wellness Center in Caloocan for CSE module development and community events. Future-focused initiatives included plans with ZFF and UNFPA to train SK leaders on governance and leadership, alongside signing an MOU with World Citi Colleges, reinforcing the importance of sustained partnerships and linkage building in advancing reproductive health and development goals.

CAPACITY-BUILDING

In its commitment to empowering various sectors through capacity-building initiatives, The Forum for Family Planning and Development has undertaken several impactful activities. In February 2023, technical support was provided to the Philippine Women’s University (PWU) for module development and training, which focused on integrating Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity, and Expression (SOGIE) into a training manual for fathers, equipping them to combat violence against women and children (VAWC). This initiative not only fostered greater awareness among fathers but also promoted gender sensitivity within families and communities the university partner is serving.

Recognizing the power of youth in driving social change, The Forum organized and facilitated multiple youth-focused activities throughout 2023-2024. In June 2023, coaching sessions were conducted for youth leaders, enhancing their skills in effectively communicating advocacies. This was followed by a national Advocacy Project Development Training in September, where 80 youth leaders from across the country were equipped with the tools to design and execute impactful advocacy projects. By October of the same year, this effort had scaled up to a Community Project Development and Implementation Workshop, empowering 80 youth leaders to conceptualize and implement transformative initiatives in their respective communities.

The Forum further extended its reach by supporting the University of the Philippines College of Nursing (UPCN) Leadership Development Course for Public Health Nurses (two batches: 2023 and 2024). As a module developer and resource person, The Forum contributed to the professional growth of 80 public health nurses from across the country, strengthening their leadership capabilities and their capacity to address public health challenges in their localities, specifically in pushing for health regulations and advocating for political support to health budget and policies.

Through these efforts, The Forum has continued its unwavering commitment to fostering inclusive leadership and advancing gender equality, health, and youth empowerment.





AWARENESS RAISING EFFORTS

This report highlights The Forum for Family Planning and Development's efforts in 2023 and 2024 to advance awareness and advocacy on comprehensive sexuality education (CSE), adolescent reproductive health (ARH), and family planning. Key initiatives included forums, webinars, and summits that engaged youth leaders, health workers, and private institutions, reaching thousands of participants. The Forum also led impactful campaigns for World Contraception Day (WCD), leveraging webinars, media activities, and social media to promote informed reproductive health decisions. These activities significantly strengthened public awareness and empowered individuals to make responsible health choices.



In 2023, The Forum for Family Planning and Development actively supported various awareness-raising initiatives on comprehensive sexuality education (CSE) and adolescent reproductive health (ARH). In April, The Forum provided technical support for CSE-ARH forums at Bicol University, engaging over 700 youth leaders on critical topics, including comprehensive sexuality education (#TalkSex), prevention of sexual harassment (#SafeSpaces), and the salient features of the Philippine HIV and AIDS Policy Act. These forums, conducted in partnership with UNSDSN Youth and the Philippine Society of Sexual and Reproductive Health Nurses (PSORHN), empowered young leaders to advocate for sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR). The Forum also contributed to private sector initiatives, serving as a resource for the PRISM Summit organized by Pandr, a BPO, in July 2023, and providing support for a Barangay Health Workers (BHW) forum held in Baguio City in August.



WORLD CONTRACEPTION DAY

Key activity The Forum has been spearheading since 2018 is the World Contraception Day (WCD), the first time the Philippines has joined this global movement. In 2023 and 2024, we organized campaigns for World Contraception Day, featuring webinars, media activities, and social media outreach that reached broad audiences and empowered individuals to make informed reproductive health decisions, advancing public awareness and advocacy for accessible SRHR services.



In celebration of World Contraception Day (WCD) 2023, The Forum in partnership with its partners, CPD and Bayer Philippines, have spearheaded impactful activities to promote informed decision-making in reproductive health. Forum's efforts included a four-session webinar series that reached over 350 participants and garnered over 1,500 views through Facebook Live broadcasts. To further amplify the campaign, The Forum developed and disseminated engaging IEC materials, conducted two media activities, and ramped up its social media presence, achieving significant reach and engagement.

Building on this success, The Forum collaborated with CPD and Bayer Philippines for the World Contraception Day 2024 campaign, themed "Empowering Choices, One Decision at a Time." The initiative featured compelling social media collaterals that resonated widely and raised awareness about family planning and reproductive health. A Media Conference served as a campaign highlight, providing a platform for dialogue and advocacy to strengthen public understanding and commitment to reproductive health. These initiatives collectively advanced awareness, empowered individuals to make informed health decisions, and reinforced the importance of accessible family planning and SRHR services.



NETWORK-LINKAGES BUILDING

At the start of 2023, The Forum for Family Planning and Development initiated a courtesy call with the newly appointed Executive Director of the Commission on Population and Development (POPCOM), Undersecretary Lisa Grace Bersales. This meeting marked a significant step in sustaining the partnership with CPD, a key government agency in advancing family planning, and population and development.

Post-ReachYouth Project activities demonstrated The Forum's commitment to sustaining partnerships and networks. Continued collaboration with USAID's REACHHEALTH program and active participation in Region VII's RPRH Law Regional Implementation Team meetings underscored its role in advancing reproductive health initiatives. The Forum maintained strong partnerships with the Philippine Obstetrical and Gynecological Society (POGS-Cebu) and the Philippine Nurses Association (PNA-Cebu), while also supporting the Department of Education (DepEd) in the Cebu Tri-Cities by distributing over 1,000 copies of adolescent-focused family planning booklets. In addition, consultations were held to maximize the use of The Forum's Comprehensive Sexuality Education (CSE) and Adolescent Reproductive Health (ARH) materials. The Forum played a key role in the awarding of DOH level 1 accreditation to facilities that it had advocated for, ensuring the establishment of teen centers as part of accessible health services for youth.

After a year has passed of the end of the SULONG RH Project (Gates), The Forum reconnected with local partners in Albay, Cebu, and Baguio-Benguet to explore new avenues for collaboration. This effort highlights the importance of sustaining relationships and building new linkages to ensure the continuity and impact of reproductive health initiatives.

The Forum provided technical assistance to the AHF GABAY Wellness Center in Caloocan by helping them develop a Comprehensive Sexuality Education (CSE) module, facilitating CSE sessions for World AIDS Day and community events, and supporting the center's reorganization, assessment, and monitoring processes. Such efforts demonstrate The Forum's dedication to strengthening local capacities in addressing sexual and reproductive health needs.

Looking ahead, The Forum engaged in a meeting with the Zuellig Family Foundation (ZFF) and UNFPA to plan for the rollout of leadership and data-driven governance training for Sangguniang Kabataan (SK) leaders. The importance of network-building was further emphasized with the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between World Citi Colleges and The Forum, solidifying their partnership in advancing shared goals.

Through these activities, The Forum renewed its commitment to its partners and consistently sustained strong networks and partnerships. It enabled The Forum to forge new partnerships, embracing the importance of fostering linkages with allies to ensure sustained progress in the fields of population, health, and development.

ADVOCACY ACTIVITIES

As a key advocate for reproductive health and rights, The Forum for Family Planning and Development has demonstrated unwavering leadership in advancing high-level advocacy initiatives. In May 2023, The Forum initiated critical discussions with the Commission on Population and Development (POPCOM) and the Department of Health (DOH) to revive the National Conference on Family Planning (NCFP), recognizing its vital role in addressing pressing population and health issues. By September 2023, these efforts culminated in mobilizing the NCFP Convenors and securing the support of key development partners, underscoring The Forum's ability to rally stakeholders for a unified cause.



In October 2023, the momentum continued with the formalization of the 3rd NCFP National Steering Committee, a pivotal step toward ensuring strategic oversight and guidance for the conference. This was followed by the formation of the 3rd NCFP National Program and Scientific Committee in January 2024, demonstrating The Forum's commitment to evidence-based approaches and inclusive planning. In September 2024, the NCFP Youth Conference brought young advocates to the forefront, highlighting the importance of youth leadership in reproductive health initiatives. The main NCFP 2024 conference in November served as a culminating event, bringing together policymakers, health practitioners, and advocates to advance family planning and reproductive health in the Philippines.



In addition to national initiatives, The Forum played a leading role in regional advocacy efforts. As the lead of the Scientific Committee, The Forum co-organized the 1st Bicol Regional HIV/AIDS and SRH Summit in December 2023. This milestone event showcased The Forum's commitment to addressing regional public health challenges through collaborative and evidence-driven approaches.

The conceptualization of the first National Family Planning Conference on the Philippines was inspired by the International Conference on Family Planning (ICFP) in Bali, Indonesia from January 25 to 27, 2016 where at least 50 Filipino RH and FP advocates gathered to discuss FP advocacies and beyond. On the same year, the First National Family Planning Conference (NCFP) in the Philippines was held on November 20 to 22, 2016 in Novotel Hotel, Quezon City.

The main objective of the 1st NCFP was to help sustain public and political support for family planning through the conduct of the country's First National Family Planning Conference, adopting the theme, "Invest in Family Planning, Fulfill the Promise of the RPRH". There is a need to sustain public and political support for FP in order to strengthen the implementation of the RPRH Law at the local level, and to get massive support against the Temporary Restraining Order (TRO) on implants.

The 2nd National Family Planning Conference was held in Waterfront Hotel, Cebu City on November 8 to 9, 2017 with the theme, "Delivering the Promise: Family Planning on the Ground". The event generated new insights and provided new pathways in bridging the gaps in the demand generation and service delivery, as well as strengthened commitments from partner agencies, development partners, private organizations, civil society organizations, among others, with the end view to serve the wider populace with unmet need for Family Planning.

This 2024, the 3rd National Conference on Family Planning (NCFP 2024) was held in Pasig City, Metro Manila – focusing on the theme, "Family Planning and Population Development: Innovate, Collaborate, and Accelerate Now!"




Figure 1. 3rd NCFP Composition of Delegates

At a glance, as shown in figure 1, the 3rd NCFP brought together delegates representing national government agencies, Local Government Units (LGUs), Non-Government Organizations (NGOs) and Community-Based Organizations (CBOs), academic institutions, media, youth, and other development partners. Of the 517 registered delegates, 182 (35%) are from LGUs coming from all over the country. They represented the biggest number of delegates. Under a devolved health service delivery system, the presence of more LGU representatives was a positive indicator for the family planning and reproductive health program.

There were 126 (26%) participants from various national government agencies like the DOH and its attached agencies, the National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA), Commission on Population and Development (CPD), Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG), National Youth Commission and the Department of Education (DepEd). The participation of 132 (24%) Nongovernment/Community Based Organizations and the private sector and 70 (14%) members from the academe also ensured a good representation of other key stakeholders.



The conference also made sure that the voices of young people are just as strong with 166 youth from all over the country attending the 3rd NCFP Youth Conference held on September 17-18, 2024.

Good practices, new and innovative approaches and technologies, latest studies, program and policy reviews, stories from the field, inspiring lessons and new learnings were captured in 62 paper presentations and four Satellite and Skills Building Sessions. Renewed commitments to support family planning were articulated by international development partners like UNFPA, USAID, FP2030 as well as national government and the Office of the President.



SUPPORT TO REGIONAL CONFERENCES ON FAMILY PLANNING AND POPULATION AND DEVELOPMENT (RCFP)

The Forum as member of the NCFP National Steering Committee, and one of its conveners, support was extended to Regional V (Bicol) and the National Capital Region (NCR) RCFPs.

In August 2024, The Forum played a pivotal role in regional conferences that highlighted the significance of primary health care and its impact on diverse subgroups. During the Region 5 Regional Conference on Family Planning (RCFP), The Forum presented a study examining the effects of primary health care on four key groups: the elderly, adult males, mothers, teenagers, and youth in Tabaco City. This presentation underscored the importance of tailoring healthcare strategies to meet the unique needs of each subgroup, contributing to more inclusive and effective health systems.



In the same month, The Forum also served as a session moderator for the NCR RCFP. In this capacity, it facilitated discussions on at least 12 papers and research studies, providing an interactive platform for sharing evidence-based findings. The Forum ensured the active participation of youth scholars and paper presenters from its academic partners, fostering a collaborative environment where diverse perspectives could be exchanged. These high-level advocacy activities are crucial in driving forward regional health and development agendas, supporting and co-leading such conferences amplifies the impact of policy dialogues and promotes the engagement of key stakeholders in addressing pressing issues in health and population development.



DEMOGRAPHIC DIVIDEND EFFORT INDEX (DDEI) POLICY WORKSHOP IN THE PHILIPPINES

The Philippines Demographic Dividend Policy Workshop, held on November 19, 2024, marked a significant milestone in advancing high-level advocacy for harnessing the country's potential demographic dividend. This first-of-its-kind initiative was a collaboration between the Commission on Population and Development (CPD) and Johns Hopkins University (JHU), under the groundbreaking Demographic Dividend Effort Index (DDEI) project. The DDEI, which aims to measure the level of effort the Philippines is putting into achieving the benefits of a demographic dividend, represents an innovative approach to evidence-based policymaking. Data collected between 2022 and 2023 were presented during the workshop, offering critical insights into the country's progress across key sectors.

The workshop brought together at least 30 participants, including policymakers, development practitioners, and advocates, who engaged with sectoral experts in six critical areas: family planning, maternal and child health, labor market, education, women's empowerment, and governance and economic institutions. Experts addressing the intersection of climate change with demographic trends also enriched the discussions. The event served as a platform to analyze the DDEI findings and, through interactive discussions, develop concrete policy recommendations to address gaps and leverage opportunities for achieving the demographic dividend.

This workshop underscored the importance of collaboration and high-level advocacy led by The Forum for Family Planning and Development and its partners. By spearheading this initiative, The Forum and its allies demonstrated their commitment to shaping responsive, data-driven policies that will not only optimize the demographic dividend but also ensure sustainable development outcomes for the Philippines. Held as a pre-conference event to the National Conference on Family Planning (NCFP) on November 20-21, 2024, the workshop laid a strong foundation for aligning family planning and population development efforts with broader national goals.



Dr. Corazon M. Raymundo, president of The Forum for Family Planning and Development, has been recognized as one of the 10 outstanding pioneers in sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR).
